Prayer to St. Marguerite d'Youville

Saint Marguerite d'Youville, we turn to you in humble prayer because your life speaks to us of goodness, compassion and love in a world of suffering, anguish and pain. It is not unlike the world you knew as you went about doing good with a great love for the human family, with preference for the poorest of all. Your dream of universal charity became a mission in the Church. We give thanks to you for the inspiring vision that is ours today as your dream lives on. May we learn as you did the file-giving power of love, the profound peace of unfailing trust, the deep mystery of suffering and pain, the strength-giving solace of prayer. Saint Marguerite, teach us to listen. in the silence of our hearts. to the God of Mercy and Compassion, that we, too, may be signs of God's love to all peoples of our world. Amen

For Matthew the kingdom of God – the relationship between God and humanity – is clearly fulfilled in Jesus the Christ. Traditional aspects of feasting, of gathering in community to celebrate the intimate life-giving relationship of marriage, are allusions to oneness with Christ through the Eucharist.

However, other aspects of today's Gospel parable are shocking. Some invitees are uninterested, others obnoxious. The host responds with harshness, intolerance, dismissing those who refuse the invitation as unworthy and banishing one who arrives unprepared to perpetual suffering. How are we to understand these images in relation to the kingdom of God?

It is helpful to remember that the tellers of our sacred stories bring something of themselves into narratives. Written at least 50 years after Jesus' death and resurrection, Matthew's Gospel has a single focus. Its author speaks passionately for Jesus as the anticipated Messiah. Frustrated with those who disagree, perhaps Matthew uses the chilling image of isolation in darkness to shock his contemporaries into rethinking their unbelief.

In Mathew's Gospel, all are called to choose the peace and fulfillment of the kingdom of God. In doing so, all commit to celebrate Christ's transformative love through their relationships with God, self and community.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

The Eucharist I want to write a bit about the Eucharist today. That sacrament of sacraments. That extraordinary and ordinary event that occurs over and over in our churches, day in day out.

We must always remember the context and origin of the Eucharist. It is of course the last supper. And the last supper is really about two events-the institution of the Eucharist and the washing of the disciples feet. Unfortunately we only do the Eucharist part at regular mass. The washing of feet only occurs once a year on Holy Thursday. But they are inseparably linked. Both speak in a compelling way about our vocation as followers of Christ. I have encountered many people who do not want to have their feet washed on Holy Thursday. And I quite understand that. Foot washing is a very messy and time consuming business. It is very awkward even embarrassing to sit in front of a congregation, to remove your shoes and socks and have your feet washed. No matter how hard we try to sanitize the rituals with fresh towels and customized basins. It is still a rather messy thing.

Moreover, having someone stoop down to wash your feet, caressing them and drying them off, can feel a bit over the top. It's a little bit too intimate, too gracious, for many people. Many people feel exactly like Peter in John's Gospel and feel inclined to say," You will never wash my feet."

Well guess what. It is awkward and messy to love people too. And that's the challenge of the washing of the feet -loving the difficult ones. The uncle who has the drinking problem. The aunt who likes to tell you the same story over and over at the family gatherings, the elderly patient with dementia. So in a real sense the Eucharist is for everyday living. The washing of the feet leads directly to the bread and the cup. In his moment of vulnerability and mortality as Jesus is about to offer himself on the cross, he washes his disciples feet, as if to tell us that if you want to cope with the messiness and burdens of life if you want to be free, you need the Eucharist and nourishment. The Eucharist is for everyday living.

It is for living in a world of frustration and imperfection. I always find it a little bit funny that some people when they get fed up and frustrated they stay away from church. When it should be just the opposite. When you have had enough, Church is the place to be. The basin and the towel leading to the bread and a cup. They both go together. Bringing your everyday living to church and offer it up.
