St. Peter Damian (1007-1072),


Bishop and Doctor of the Church, Feast day, Feb. 21

The young Peter was orphaned at a young age. Subsequently, one elder brother worked him mercilessly. Upon discovering the ill-treatment, another older brother, who was a priest, while visiting his siblings, took pity on his youngest brother and arranged for his education. Peter proved to be an attentive and eager student. His voracious absorption of literature led to him being widely recognized as a master of Latin prose, in word and in speech.

Content to live as a hermit, his renown for intelligence and sanctity became widely sought. He was asked to lead a reform of the Church; he was consulted by Cardinals and Popes. From his observations, even the most devout and zealous of ecclesiastics were timid to implement his full recommendations. It was one thing to draw attention to corrupt Church practices of clergy who were more interested in money than faith; it was quite another to shed light on a much darker practice. The bold St. Peter Damian wrote extensively on this topic in a work called, "Liber Gomorrhianus.' That which is charitably taught, in this masterpiece, is as equally sensitive and explosive now as then.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK





This simple statement is loaded with meaning. It states i in the first part that the primary purpose for the com-

ing of Christ was to save us. Beyond his wonderful teachings, his miraculous works, his exalted position, he is the Christ of Mark's gospel. A powerful figure who "even the wind and sea obey" Mark 4:41. He has power to liberate us from oppression but more importantly to forgive sin. There is a tendency today to reduce Jesus and his teachings to secular humanism and to ignore his salvific purpose which this part of the creed emphasizes. Finally, the statement also implies that man cannot save himself.

The second part of the statement affirms a great truth. That God has left his exalted position and reached down to us. He has come to us, lived like us and taken on our human existence. More significantly God has taken on our weakness and vulnerability. St. Paul puts it plainly in Romans when he says." "Since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, they are justified by his grace as a gift" (Rom 3:23) I kind of like the economic analogy someone made when they mentioned that man is like a failed economy. What he needs is not economic advice but a massive bailout. This is why he "came down from heaven, for our salvation."

ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent for Catholics. The ashes we receive on our forehead in the shape of a cross serve as an outward sign of our sinfulness and need for penance. The ashes also symbolize our mortality, a reminder that one day we will die and our bodies will return to dust. Hence the traditional words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return".

The tradition of receiving ashes has its origins in the Old Testament, where sinners performed acts of public penance. It was Pope Urban II who in the 11th century recommended that all Catholics take part in the practice of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday. In the 12th century it became customary that the ashes used on Ash Wednesday were made by burning the previous year's palm branches. Ash Wednesday is also a day of fasting and abstinence for Catholics.

First Friday Adoration, is a Eucharistic adoration held the first Friday of every month in the church. It begins with 9:15 AM Mass and is followed by Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament for the remainder of the day. Adoration concludes at 7:00pm followed by Mass. WHAT FIRST FRIDAY ADORATION PARTICIPANTS DO: Come any time during the adoration hours (approximately 10:00 AM to 6:30 PM) to

spend some quiet, prayerful time with Jesus. Adoration participants commit to specific time. These "Guardians of the Eucharist" ensure that the Blessed Sacrament is never left alone.
