Whether 'tis nobler in the mind to suffer The slings and arrows of outrageous fortune, Or to take arms against a sea of troubles, And by opposing end them? It is no longer a given that the typical a post secondary school graduate will be familiar with or have studied the one-time renowned "to be or not to be" soliloquy from Shakespeare's, Hamlet. The decolonizing trends in education have pushed aside that which was formerly regarded as essential reading. As most commentaries will expound, the greatness of Shakespeare's prose, though veiled in old English, is an accurate study into human psychology through the presented plights of his numerous compelling semi historical/fictional characters. In Hamlet's introspective anguished brooding of whether to seek revenge for his father's murder or whether to opt out of having to act daringly by ending his life, the reader can insert their own particular personal torment.

With the increasing expansion of the deadly cloud of euthanasia across the country and promised legislative limitations succinctly falling aside, more of our population is being seduced into suicide. A Canadian census for the year 2021 put the number of those who opted for MAiD at over 10,000 souls! As human life is being valued based on its utility and capacity to perform an "essential service," the slippery slope is entrapping those who not only face terminal illnesses, but for far too many who are succumbing to despair.

Shakespeare warns of those dreams that may come in thinking that death will offer the hope of a sleep without nightmares. With a society that has renounced belief in God, the fearful uncertainty of what comes after death has seemingly been removed. Shakespeare knew well that our baptism into our Christian faith tells us otherwise; battling furiously in the knowledge of a triumphant Lord who himself has passed through the way of human misery is a God worth clinging onto and invoking in whatever dark temptations we confront. Praise be our Paschal King!

What did they see? Burial shrouds lying on the floor of an empty tomb. Maybe that convinced them that He hadn't 🕌 pensive burial linens and left the corpses behind.

But notice the repetition of the word "tomb"-seven times in nine verses. They saw the empty tomb and they believed what He had promised: that God would raise Him on the third day.

Chosen to be His "witnesses," today's First Reading tells us, the Apostles were "commissioned . . . to preach . . . and testify" to all that they had seen-from His anointing with the Holy Spirit at the Jordan to the empty tomb.

We are the children of the apostolic witnesses. That is why we still gather early in the morning on the first day of every week to celebrate this feast of the empty tomb, to give thanks for "Christ our life," as today's Epistle calls Him.

Baptized into His death and Resurrection, we live the heavenly life of the risen Christ, our lives "hidden with Christ in God." We are now His witnesses, too. But we testify to things we cannot see but only believe; we seek in earthly things what is above.

We live in memory of the Apostles' witness, like them eating and drinking with the risen Lord at the altar. And we wait in hope for what the Apostles told us would come-the day when we too "will appear with Him in glory."
