Heavenly Father, we pray for your protection and blessings upon our families and upon our parish community. As you offer us the example of Jesus, Mary and Joseph in their closeness to each other, collaboration in daily work, and fidelity in all manners of holiness, we recognize how far we often are from imitating them. As we face challenges of family unity, anxieties over financial stability, and lukewarmness towards commitment to growth in prayer and worship, provide us with the abundant signs that you sustain us in every good effort and openness to humble faith. We ask this in the name of Christ, the newborn King. Amen.

I know by acting in this way I have not chosen an easy path and that I risk not being understood by many of my fellow citizens. To those who may be shocked by my decision, I ask them: Is it right that I am the only Belgian citizen to be forced to act against his conscience in such a crucial area? Is the freedom of conscience sacred for everyone except for the king?"

King Baudouin of Belgium (1930-1993), letter to the Prime Minister, 1990

During the octave of Christmas (December 28), standing in contrast to the joy of babe in the manger, is the somber Feast of the Holy Innocents; the death of Bethlehem's boys as ordered by King Herod is a portent of the eventual sacrifice of newborn Saviour. The treachery of Herod and his tight grip on power all too often seems the only way for those of high office. The cited quote of King Baudouin provides a dramatic illustration of the counter-cultural and enduring legacy for those who embrace the gospel's demands.

King Baudouin took the throne at the age of 20. His father, King Leopold III, was compelled to abnegate the crown for his perceived lack of resistance to the Germans during WWII. The newly installed young monarch was very convinced that close discipleship to Jesus was the best way to heal a broken Europe. During his reign, he balanced the tensions within his own people and their varying backgrounds of German, Flemish, French and Dutch influences; he helped lay the foundations for the then promising European Union; he oversaw the successful transfer from a colonial to independent Congo. But his most notable achievement was his willingness to renounce the throne when compelled to sign into law the recently promulgated abortion law. King Baudouin and his faithful wife, Queen Fabiola, were torn in conscience in wanting to uphold the unity of the constitutional monarchy they had vowed to serve yet knew they had to oppose a law that undermined the natural rights of Belgians to be born. The pressure on them was immense: their surrounding European counterparts had all passed liberal laws approving of the termination of pregnancies. The Christian Democrat party in power pleaded for the King to sign the law since it at least promised to limit the terms of abortion rather than yield to the momentum of the more leftist parties who wanted no restrictions whatsoever. The Belgian Royals, who had undergone five miscarriages and had no birthed no successor, traveled to the Holy House of Loreto, Italy to pray for strength and peace to hold fast to their resistance. They refused to cooperate with the intrinsically evil proposal. The impact of the heroic resistance across the nation was so great that the Belgian parliament had to move fast to acknowledge the King's right to abstain and begged him to return to rule. King Baudouin died soon thereafter by way of heart failure while visiting Spain. Pope Francis announced his intention to beatify the noble King during his September 2024 visit to Brussels.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Why did Jesus choose to become a baby born of a mother and father and to spend all but His last years living in an ordinary human family? In part, to reveal God's plan to make all people live as one "holy family" in His Church. In the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, God re-



veals our true home. We're to live as His children, "chosen ones, holy and beloved," as the First Reading puts it. The family advice we hear in today's readings—for mothers, fathers, and children—is all solid and practical. Happy homes are the fruit of our faithfulness to the Lord, we sing in today's Psalm. But the Liturgy is inviting us to see more, to see how, through our family obligations and relationships, our families become heralds of the family of God that He wants to create on earth.

Jesus shows us this in today's Gospel. His obedience to His earthly parents flows directly from His obedience to the will of His heavenly Father. Joseph and Mary aren't identified by name, but three times are called His "parents" and are referred to separately as His "mother" and "father." Th e emphasis is all on their their familial ties to Jesus. But these ties are emphasized only so that Jesus, in the first words He speaks in Luke's Gospel, can point us beyond that earthly relationship to the Fatherhood of God.

In what Jesus calls "My Father's house," every family finds its true meaning and purpose. The Temple we read about in the Gospel today is God's house, His dwelling. But it's also an image of the family of God, the Church.

In our families we're to build up this household, this family, this living temple of God until He reveals His new dwelling among us and says of every person: "I shall be his God and he will be My son". **F. Reg.**
