He boasted that he was someone great, and all the people, both high and low, gave him their attention and exclaimed, "This man is rightly called the Great Power of God." They followed him because he had amazed them for a long time with his sorcery.

When Simon saw that the Spirit was given at the laying on of the apostles' hands, he offered them money and said, "Give me also this ability so that everyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit."

Peter answered: "May your money perish with you, because you thought you could buy the gift of God with money! You have no part or share in this ministry, because your heart is not right before God. Repent of this wickedness and pray to the Lord in the hope that he may forgive you for having such a thought in your heart. For I see that you are full of bitterness and captive to sin." Acts of the Apostles, 8.9-11,20-24

In the days leading up to the liturgical feast of the Conversion of St. Paul (Jan 25), the Church promotes the week of Christian Unity. In an effort to foster dialog and reconciliation between the separated ecclesial communities caused by Protestantism, the Catholic Church looks to encourage appropriate encounters of common prayer, Scripture study, and charitable outreach between various denominations. Looking back to Martin Luther's initial irresolvable disputes with the Holy See in regards to justification, Luther cited the abuse of ongoing practices (nepotism, indulgences, absenteeism) that were widely causing scandal and sacrilege. In the cited Scripture passage, the story of how "simony" acquired its name is told. Simon "the Magician" and his deliberate wish to buy a spiritual power for a worldly benefit is rebuked strongly by Peter. This offensive blasphemy is to be carefully avoided and causes astute members of the faithful to cringe when they see glimpses and echoes of its manifestation. So that, while the selling of all kinds of religious articles and parish fundraising items has become an established and sanctioned practice in major shrines and parishes world wide when done properly, the discerning believer can often spot the difference. For example, it is one thing to sell religious art and books, but when one never sees that a pastor has any appreciation for sacred art history or a habit of theological reading, one wonders. It is one thing to offer healing masses but when a priest has insufficient knowledge and reverence for proper liturgical norms, one wonders. When the promotion of holy healing oils is not backed up with time spent before the burning wax of the sanctuary lamp of the Blessed Sacrament, one wonders. While the division caused by Lutherism was sad, tragic and harmful to the whole Body of Christ, he at least brought attention to some embarrassing flagrant sins that any Catholic can agree ought to be monitored and corrected. Such ongoing conversion is one path forward to full restored communion.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Think of these first weeks after Christmas as a season of "epiphanies." The liturgy is showing us who Jesus is and what He has revealed about our relationship with God. Last week and the week before, the imagery was royal and filial—Jesus is the newborn king of the Jews who



makes us coheirs of Israel's promise, beloved children of God. Last week in the liturgy we went to a baptism.

This week we're at a wedding. We're being shown another dimension of our relationship with God. If we're sons and daughters of God, it's because we've married into the family. Have you ever wondered why the Bible begins and ends with a wedding—Adam and Eve's in the garden and the marriage supper of the Lamb? Throughout the Bible, marriage is the symbol of the covenant relationship God desires with His chosen people. He is the groom, humanity His beloved and sought after bride. We see this reflected beautifully in today's First Reading. When Israel breaks the covenant, she is compared to an unfaithful spouse. But God promises to take her back, to "espouse" her to Him forever in an everlasting covenant. That's why in today's Gospel Jesus performs His first public "sign" at a wedding feast. Jesus is the divine bridegroom, calling us to His royal wedding feast. By His New Covenant, He will become "one flesh" with all humanity in the Church. By our baptism, each of us has been betrothed to Christ as a bride to a husband.

The new wine that Jesus pours out at today's feast is the gift of the Holy Spirit given to His bride and body, as today's Epistle says. This is the "salvation" announced to the "families of nations" in today's Psalm
