Whether in the obscure Pennsylvanian town of Punxsutawney or in whatever locale you happened to find yourself, the predicament of being stuck in an endless, dreary time-loop is a motif that goes beyond the narrative of this 30 year old successful film. This cult classic is now perennially associated with the 2nd of February. The gloomy quandary of deja-vu forever triggers understandable cynical winter fears of inescapable dark, cold, monotonous days with scant prospect of hopeful change. Intriguing to note is the Catholic contrast of comparing whether the improvement of fortunes is best realized upon the superstitious fate of a celebrity groundhog or the Presentation of the Christ Child in the Temple: on one hand - the sign of a shadow cast, on the other - a light to be revealed to the nations. In the movie, the main character is apoplectic with having to be imprisoned in a stagnant job and a disappointing life as he is compelled to have to repeat the same role again and again with the same circle of acquaintances. In the gospel, the prophets Simeon and Anna, both advanced in age, spend their time, day after day in the Temple, waiting to see the fulfillment of God's plan for redemption. The quick take away lesson for us is suggested - the beneficial strategy of finding time before the light of Our Lord radiating from the Tabernacle is an essential way of not buckling under the weight of daily routine. Moreover, time spent reciting the successive beads of the rosary can allow Our Blessed Mother to provide the encouraging insights to help us make progress since she is the one who is identified in knowing "the secret thoughts of many." With such subtle but abundant available graces, the boredom and bleakness of a forever groundhog day can be broken.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Today's feast marks the Presentation of the Lord Jesus in the Temple, forty days after he was born. As the firstborn, he belonged to God. According to the Law, Mary and Joseph were required to take him to the Temple and "redeem" him by paying five shekels. At the same time, the Law required the child's mother to offer sacrifice in



order to overcome the ritual impurity brought about by childbirth. So the feast we celebrate shows a curious turn of events. The Redeemer seems to be redeemed. She who is all-pure presents herself to be purified. Such is the humility of our God. Such is the humility of the Blessed Virgin. They submit to the law even though they are not bound by it.

However, the Gospel story nowhere mentions Jesus' "redemption," but seems to describe instead a religious consecration—such as a priest might undergo. Saint Luke tells us that Jesus is "presented" in the Temple, using the same verb that Saint Paul uses to describe the offering of a sacrifice. Another parallel is the Old Testament dedication of Samuel to the Temple as a priest.

The drama surrounding Jesus' conception and birth began in the Temple—when the Archangel visited Mary's kinsman, Zechariah the priest. And now the story of Jesus' infancy comes to a fitting conclusion, again in the Temple.

All the readings today concern Jerusalem, the Temple, and the sacrificial rites. The first reading comes from the Prophet Malachi, who called the priests to return to faithful service—and foretold a day when a Messiah would arrive with definitive purification of the priesthood.

Likewise, the Psalm announces to Jerusalem that Jerusalem is about to receive a great visitor. The Psalmist identifies him as "The LORD of hosts... the king of glory."

Christ now arrives as the long-awaited priest and redeemer. He is also the sacrifice. Indeed, as his life will show, He is the Temple itself.
