The Church is intolerant in principle because she believes; she is tolerant in practice because she loves. The enemies of the Church are tolerant in principle because they do not believe; they are intolerant in practice because they do not love.

In the 100 year aftermath of the French Revolution, traditional Catholicism had been predominantly abandoned by the social elite and intelligentsia and preserved by peasant and pious. Originating from a devout family in the small southern French town of Auch, halfway between Bordeaux and Lourdes, the young Reginald showed keen intellectual abilities by little by way of religious fervour. In entering into the world of academia, his conversion occurred by way of study and pursuing classically trained philosophers and theologians. He shifted his specialty from medicine to religious vocation, entering the Order of Preachers. His rise in theological prominence was on account of his being able to reintroduce the medieval work of St. Thomas Aquinas; specifically, he integrated the robust scholastic method of argumentation with the mystical writings of St. John of the Cross – showing the two valid approaches of dogmatic precision and rich interior spirituality to have a complementary and mutually beneficial influence upon each other. He was assigned as professor of dogmatic theology to the prestigious school of Angelicum in Rome where he oversaw the doctoral studies of a wide number prominent clerics of the early to mid 20<sup>th</sup> century. Reginald Garrigou-Lagrange understood the unfolding battle of the infiltrating influences of Protestantism and the Enlightenment upon the longheld sacred teachings of the Church. The papal reigns of Pius X-XII, Leo XIII, and Benedict XV all tried to resist the sweeping "modernist" change and sought Fr. Garrigou-Lagrange's stabilizing and sound contribution. His work is invoked in our own day against the similar trends that further erode traditional church teachings in the pressure of accommodating to ideologies that are foreign to Christian revelation. The cited quote is a reminder that the Church has always had a pastoral approach that is all sufficient at confronting the messy complexity of human sinfulness while still remaining true to our Lord's prescribed saving remedy.

#### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

In today's readings we hear Jesus speaking in Galilee as well as a Jewish sage named Sirach writing in Jerusalem more than a century earlier. The two of them touch upon a single truth: The words that come out of us make known the hidden thoughts within us. Speech reveals the secrets of the heart.



Sirach teaches that speaking is "the test of men" and their character.

One who is upright will utter words that are truthful and encouraging to others. But one whose heart is cluttered with "refuse" will be exposed, since the "fruit" of his mouth speaks volumes about the "tree" that produces it. Sirach also compares the testing of our words to clay fired in a kiln—if properly prepared, a useful vessel emerges; but if the clay is not fully dried, it will break apart in the extreme heat.

In a similar way, Jesus insists that a person speaks "out of the abundance of the heart." He too compares our speech, whether good or bad, to what grows on a tree: "For no good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit.

Both readings urge us to make wholesome speech a habit. After all, much about who we are is brought to light through what we say. But there's an additional step: The Lord is asking us to look inward, to examine our hearts and fill them with the "good treasure" that God desires.

Why do purity of heart and speech matter so much? Because, as Jesus declares elsewhere: "by your words you will be justified, and by your words you will be condemned". They matter because they help to decide our final judgment, and this is where the Second Reading comes in. Paul reminds us that God will destroy death forever, and if we are to share in this victory and live forever with the Lord, then we must take all steps necessary to give our hearts and lips to what is good.

#### ASH WEDNESDAY



Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent for Catholics. The ashes we receive on our forehead in the shape of a cross serve as an outward sign of our sinfulness and need for penance. The ashes also symbolize our mortality, a reminder that one day we will die and our bodies will return to dust. Hence the traditional words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return".

The tradition of receiving ashes has its origins in the Old Testament, where sinners performed acts of public penance. It was Pope Urban II who in the 11th century recommended that all Catholics take part in the practice of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday. In the 12th century it became customary that the ashes used on Ash Wednesday were made by burning the previous year's palm branches. Ash Wednesday is also a day of fasting and abstinence for Catholics.

#### FIRST FRIDAY ADORATION

First Friday Adoration, is a Eucharistic adoration held the first Friday of every month in the church. It begins with 9:15 AM Mass and is followed by Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament for the remainder of the day. Adoration concludes at 7:00pm followed by Mass.



WHAT FIRST FRIDAY ADORATION PARTICIPANTS DO: Come any time during the adoration hours (approximately 10:00 AM to 6:30 PM) to spend some quiet, prayerful time with Jesus. Adoration participants commit to specific time (There will be a sign-up sheet in the office). These "Guardians of the Eucharist" ensure that the Blessed Sacrament is never left alone.

#### FIRST FRIDAY - HOLY HOUR

Please join us in this holy hour of prayers during the Eucharistic adoration on First Fridays of every month. We start with the 3 O'clock Prayer and the Divine Mercy Chaplet at 3:00pm. Then, we continue with Prayers of Adoration, Thanksgiving, Reparation, and Intercession. We also pray the Eucharistic Rosary and the Litany of the Blessed Sacrament. We end the hour with a hymn of praise and adoration at 4:00pm. All are welcome.
